Our projects draw upon our internal expertise, the collective experience of our GAN Networks, corporate members across the world, policy partners like the International Labour Organisation (ILO), the International Organisation of Employers (IOE), the Organisation for Economic Co-Operation and Development (OECD) and Business at OECD.

We bring together stakeholders from across the public and private sectors, international organisations, and civil society. This multi stakeholder approach is motivated by an understanding that effective WBL policies and practices are dependent upon wide ranging participation.

OUR TRACK RECORD

Promoting Apprenticeship as a Path for Youth Employment in Argentina, Costa Rica, & Kenya - This multi-year project raised awareness of WBL, promoting it as a pathway to employment for vulnerable youth.

Skills for Employability – launched in the wake of COVID-19, this project focused on extending the outreach of the Microsoft Skilling Initiative in New Zealand, Colombia and Australia. Working through our GAN Networks, and based on an assessment of digital skilling policies, we implemented outreach initiatives in each country. In doing so, we enabled target populations – especially underrepresented and vulnerable communities – to access digital skills necessary in the changing world of work. [Read more](#)

Apprenticeship Strategy in Lebanon – showcasing GAN's research capacity, this study reviewed laws governing TVET and WBL in Lebanon and proposed a strategy for quality apprenticeship in the country's agricultural sector.

Promote Apprenticeships as a Path for Youth Employment – the GAN initiated partnerships with the national employers' federations in Malawi and Tanzania, launching GAN Networks in each country. These were underpinned by national scoping exercises and country assessments on apprenticeships, and the publication of good practices & toolkits for employers, tailored to the national context

Small States apprenticeships scoping study – GAN has been funded by the Commonwealth Secretariat to conduct a study on apprenticeships in the Pacific and Caribbean.
